From the General Manager - John Brown

The recent announcement that the Federal Government was providing funding for a Study Hub to be established in St Helens is a fantastic outcome resulting from a project that has been occuring over the last eight months with the support of a group of passionate locals. The project focussed on understanding the education, training and employment pathways which occur within the communities on the East Coast with a particular focus on secondary education. There are substantial barriers and challenges experienced by those wishing to pursue education beyond year 10 with a major one being access to the courses which they wish to pursue. Studying remotely isn't easy, particularly for our youth who have only ever experienced the classroom environment. Being able to pursue their tertiary and vocational education pathways locally at a study hub will really assist those looking to pursue further education whilst staying in their community. Initially starting in St Helens, the study hub approach will expand into the Fingal Valley and then down the East Coast. The St Helens hub located in Cecilia Street in Avery House should be open by the middle of this year, recruitment is currently underway for a Centre Manager. There is a lot of work to get this up and running over the next few months, it has the potential to be a 'game changer' for our community and will operate alongside the Jobs Hub, Break O'Day Employment Connect which is funded by the State Government.

Illegal Dumping in BOD - Fines over \$1000

Recently, there have been incidents of illegal dumping in our local bushland areas. St Helens Police received a report of rubbish being dumped in the bushland of Scamander. Following an investigation, a 67-year-old man was identified as the alleged offender and has been issued an infringement notice for \$1,010. The man has also been directed to clean up the illegally dumped waste under the provisions of the Litter Act 2007. Should he fail to comply, he faces a maximum penalty of up to \$10,100. In another case, a 19-year-old man was caught dumping building rubbish in a

Break O'Day residents save over 500 items from landfill

Break O'Day residents turned their unwanted items into cash on the annual Garage Sale Trail last November, generating more than \$3,000 and extending the life of over 500 pre-loved items, 42% of which would otherwise have gone to landfill.

Results of a recently released report by Garage Sale Trail and Taverner Research Group highlighted the outcomes of the waste reduction initiative made possible by Council. It showed a winwin for locals, with the average garage sale organiser taking home \$519 and shoppers saving money too with access to cheaper, secondhand products.

Mayor Mick Tucker said the research highlighted the local community's commitment to reduce waste

"Programs like Garage Sale Trail are important in shifting perceptions of secondhand and getting more people reusing items rather than sending them to landfill."

Across Break O'Day, an estimated 332 people participated in the two big weekends of garage sales as a shopper or a seller, which aims to provide a fun way for residents to reduce waste, make some money and get to know their neighbours.

Looking across the country, 297,792 Australians participated in the councilpowered circular economy event, with over 755,261 pre-loved items sold and \$3.8 million generated for the economy.

With an 18% increase in the number of people shopping secondhand over the two big weekends, organisers say it's likely the rising cost of living is driving an increasing appetite for secondhand. "More and more people are looking for ways to generate some extra cash or save money on everyday items. Buying and selling secondhand is one easy way we can all do this, whether it's hosting a garage sale or selling items online", said Barbara Gill, General Manager of Garage Sale Trail.

Weed of the month - Spanish heath

Spanish heath is one of Break O'Day's most serious invasive weeds. It is an early season flowering shrub carrying millions of tiny seeds by late winter. People often unwittingly spread the seeds in spring. Landowners are obliged to contain and control their Spanish heath and everyone can do their bit to reduce its spread. It requires well timed treatment to control and the next few months are the best. Start by planning your control strategy and take action this autumn. Spanish heath can be hand dug (roots and cut stems can re-sprout) or treated with herbicides (spraying or using the cut-stump method). Find and treat isolated plants first a nd follow-up next season. Slashing dense patches can reduce seeding this season, but must be before flowering and is not sufficient for control. Do not mow or slash after flowering and be very 'hygienic' around Spanish heath.
