## **Bay of Fires Arts Winter Arts Festival 2024**

The entertainment in Break O'Day doesn't shy away from the cold and much has already been happening this Winter. The June long weekend was an opportunity for locals and visitors to enjoy the art and activities of the Bay of Fires Winter Arts Festival. The festival is a chance for local and national artists to exhibit their talents and for the community to support the artists and indulge in the world of art culture.

Melissa Smith was the winner of the 2024 Bay of Fires Winter Arts \$20,000 Major Prize with her print of the unique and isolated landscape of Lake Sorell on Tasmania's Central Plateau. Over the course of the weekend, people had the chance to visit exhibitions at Panorama Hotel and St Helens Portland Hall as well as meet talented and creative artists in their own studios across Break O'Day. For those brave enough, there was even the Dawn Dash and Splash at Binalong Bay.

Talented youngsters were able to enter in the annual Youth Art Exhibition as part of the Winter Arts Festival which celebrates young artists aged 5-18. The Youth Exhibition saw its biggest show yet with 382 artwork entries. This year's theme 'OCEAN' encouraged children and young people to explore the beauty of the ocean and its ecosystem, to create artworks that showcased the ocean's flora and fauna, the impact of climate change on the ocean, or the importance of preserving the ocean's natural resources. All of the entries were unique and imaginative and it was lovely to see many young people using art as a form of expression.

Congratulations to the talented winners and finalists of the 2024 Bay of Fires Winter Arts Festival as well as the Youth Prize and to the organisers, sponsors, volunteers and supporters who made this another successful year for art and artists.

## ASBESTOS UPDATE: ANSONS BAY WASTE TRANSFER STATION (WTS)

The Ansons Bay Waste Transfer Station remains closed while Council addresses, investigates and cleans up the illegal dumping of Asbestos.

The WTS will remain closed until it has been assessed and declared safe to open by WorkSafe Tasmania.

Council will continue sending a Waste Truck to Ansons Bay on Wednesdays and Sundays from 12 noon to 2pm and will be stationed in Acacia Drive.

#### **AQUATIC FACILITY UPDATE**

A consultant has now been appointed to undertake the Break O'Day Aquatic Feasibility Study. Otium, a Victorian based organisation were formally selected at the June 20 Council Meeting by Councillors. The project received a number of high quality applications which were assessed by the Break O' Day Aquatic Working Group using a scoring matrix that included; understanding of the requirements, methodology, timeline, community engagement and capability.

We look forward to working with the consultants through this first stage of the project.

## **Community Engagement Updates**

#### BEAUMARIS PARK AND SCAMANDER SURVEY REPORT

The Beaumaris/Scamander Survey Report has now been completed and presented at the June Council Meeting. The Council supports the outdoor gym equipment to be located on the eastern side of the Scamander Bridge in the recreation space where toilets and other play equipment are located; and Council

supports the proposed Beaumaris community group's planting project so long as it does not come at the cost of other recreational facilities and activities the Park is used for.

#### BINALONG BAY BBQ AREA - CONSULTATION NOW FINISHED

Council will be replacing the BBQ area at Binalong Bay and we asked the community for feedback on where they think the new facility should be located. Feedback closed 28 June and a Report

is being prepared for discussion with Council.

#### DOG MANAGMENT POLICY REVIEW - READY TO GO TO JULY MEETING

Council reviews its dog policy every five years and recently invited community input on a draft revision of the current policy and the included dog zones. The Dog Control Act 2000 requires Council to review the policy and declared areas, and gather community feedback.

Council is now considering all the submissions we received to ensure everyone's views are fairly represented in the final policy.

Council aims to balance the needs of dog owners with public health, safety,

and protecting wildlife. The draft policy was shaped by community feedback, discussions with the Parks and Wildlife Service, Birdlife Tasmania, and other stakeholders.

The report will now go to our Council Meeting on 15 July. The policy and proposed dog zones will be updated after Council makes its final decisions and will be available to the community on our website www.bodc.tas.gov.au/property/dogs/.

## That Time of the Year - Rates Notices

The 2024/2025 rates notices will begin to hit your letterboxes and email in mid-July. Your rates fund the services we deliever to you, our community. This includes things like waste, roads and footpaths, animal control, planning and building, parks and recreation and community buildings to name just a few. ## Council Works Reports

Georges Bay Esplanade/Cecilia Street Junction - Funded under the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Phase 4 program, works have been largely completed, with junction sealing and a traffic refuge island constructed during June. Over the next fortnight, a new section of the footpath will be installed, and the landscaping work will be concluded.

#### Cecilia Street - Streetscape Design -

We extend our thanks to community members who have commented on the proposed concept streetscape design. Over the coming month, the design will be finalised, and a construction cost estimate will be established.

**Road Grading** - Council's Maintenance Grading team completed road grading at Reids Road, Terryvale Road and Argonaut Road, with grading in progress on Ansons Bay Road.

Please take care when driving through works by slowing down and watching out for our workers. Also, drive slowly on freshly graded roads.

#### **Upcoming projects**

Circassian Street/Medea Road junction upgrade — installation of a new roundabout with works commencing in August, subject to design approval by StateGrowth. Road closure details will be advised before work occurs at the site.

Bridge replacement at Cecilia Street, St Helens and Lower Germantown Road, St Marys - affected residents will be notified of the work schedule and impact on residents in the coming weeks.

## Weed of the Month - boneseed

Boneseed is a Declared Pest in Tasmania. Boneseed is considered one of the worst and most invasive weeds in Australia due to its ability to establish itself anywhere and its potential to spread. Boneseed doesn't typically flower until 18 month old, so it is important to remove plants as young as possible before they produce seed. They can produce up to 50,000 seeds per year making treatment of an area with mature plants a several year project. In the state Weed Management Act, landowners have a responsibility to remove and eradicate boneseed from their property. Due to their shallow root system, they are easily hand pulled or carefully spot sprayed with a registered herbicide.

Plants can be piled ensuring the roots are not in contact with the ground. If

seeds are present, they can be cut off, bagged and burnt. This time of year boneseed is actively growing and has not set seed, this is the perfect time to treat and remove, remembering follow up in the next year or two is essential.
